Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS)

- A signed statement is now required from a household before DSHS can issue food benefits to replace food that was purchased with food assistance but lost due to a household disaster or misfortune. See DSHS Memo, below, for more information.
- The application process has been <u>streamlined</u> for in loco parentis caregivers to receive cash assistance for a child or children in their care. Headquarters staff made updates to two procedures, <u>TANF - In Loco Parentis Procedure</u> and <u>TANF - In Loco Parentis CSD HQ Staff</u>

SUBJECT: REPLACING FOOD LOST IN A HOUSEHOLD DISASTER

Effective Aug. 1, 2024, a signed statement is required from a household prior to issuing food benefits to replace food which was purchased with food assistance and lost due to a household disaster or misfortune.

Why is this happening?

Federal rules require a signed statement from a household prior to issuing replacement benefits for food destroyed in a household disaster or misfortune. Department rules must align with the CFR.

How does this affect staff?

Households may report the loss of food purchased with food benefits, due to a household disaster or misfortune, verbally or in writing. The report must be made within 10 days of the loss.

Additionally, a signed statement attesting to the loss must be received from the household within 10 days of the date the loss was reported. Benefits cannot be replaced prior to timely receipt of the signed statement.

The signed statement must include all of the following:

- The head of household's signature
- The date(s) food purchased with Basic Food benefits was destroyed

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- The value of food lost in the disaster (purchased with food benefits)
- The cause of loss or misfortune

The DSHS 12-008 has been revised and may be used for this purpose. Use of the form is not required if an alternate signed statement includes all the other required information. A verbal signature can also be obtained by phone and documented, following the script and form linked in the <u>Replacing ACES Issued</u> Food Benefits Lost in Household Disaster or Misfortune procedure.

What changes were made?

- WAC 388-412-0040 Can I get my benefits replaced?
