## **Meeting Minutes Approval**

Nicole McGrath motioned to approve January 2023 meeting minutes. Motion seconded by jd Nielson. Drew Hill, Jennifer Forbes, Senator Frame, Sydney Forrester indicated that they did not attend the January meeting and therefore abstained from voting. Remaining council members voted unanimously to approve January meeting minutes.

## **Youth Voice**

## **About The Big Homie Program** (Lorraine, Sam and Kai)

- Pierce County based gang intervention and prevention
- 6 sites
- Provide after school programming, one to one support and mentoring, and group-based working with youth at JR community facility
- Multiple layers of mentorship within the organization

Question: What is the work that you are doing via AmeriCorps? What do you hope to get out of the work that you are doing? And what can we be doing more to support our young people?

Sam: Hopes to learn different skills to engage with kids. Finding areas to improve in the community includes increasing resources for kids. Youth need resources such as help with finances, phones, food, clothes, as well as more people to talk to and engage with.

Kai: Kids need resources the most. Basic needs - clothes, phone. Shared that one on ones are needed most so that youth can build positive connections with peer mentors.

## **Green Hill School Capitol Classroom participants**

Anthony: Shared about HB 1383 and understanding the process of supporting bill through legislative process. Shared learning experience and need to gain support for bill from State Representatives.

Aaron: Shared about planning efforts for Coalition for Juvenile Justice Emerging Leaders Committee and upcoming Youth Summit. Spoke on the continued need to center youth voices and experiences emphasizing "Those closest to the problem and the closest to the solution."

Senator Frame shared comments highlighting the need to integrate those with opposing views into spaces to meet youth. Shared Aaron's sentiment on the importance of engaging with youth to help shift culture and open hearts and minds on issues that impacted them.

#### Additional comments:

Reengagement- serving the communities that have been already impacted. Reengagement should be a priority following Covid-19 pandemic and the lack of services available to young people during the pandemic.

### **Washington Juvenile Detention: 2021 Updates**

Dr. Amanda Gilman, Principle Research Associate Center for Court Research

- 2021-3,365 admissions to detention facilities (2000 total youth)
- 38% decrease in admissions from 2020
- Reductions in detention populations have historically lead to increases in racial disproportionality
- 70-74% decrease in admissions of youth of color between 2019-2021
- Overview of how SB5290 has impacted reporting requirements

SB5438 - Would give every individual served by and through HCA and DSHS programs/facilities the right to a caring, compassionate family member involved in the advocating for their best treatment, based on their lifelong role in the person's life and their personal knowledge of their past and present welfare – not passed SB 5120 – Crisis Relief Centers – not passed
