Community Prevention Plan Brief – Ferry and Stevens Counties

About this Strong Community Network:

The Ferry/Stevens SFL network has been meeting since August of 2020, with a transition to local facilitation from <u>Spokane Tribal Network</u> since August of 2021. The network meets monthly and includes local parents, volunteers, and community agencies. (For a full list of partners, see the <u>SFL Website</u>). The community network has incorporated outreach to families and community partners via Zoom and through Community Cafes/listening sessions with families at family events and food banks in several communities across Ferry and Stevens counties, outreach to families and staff at schools, and a Facebook page. The network has also overlapped with the Healthy Ferry County Coalition as an outreach method.

Community Needs Identified:

- Lack of access to food/food security, especially during COVID pandemic; lack of access to or knowledge about existing food resources; lack of knowledge of how to make food budgets stretch
- Lack of transportation to access community resources
- Disproportionality for native families in child welfare and disproportionate outcomes for native women giving birth mothers not being heard in the hospital, racist implementation where Indigenous mothers are targeted for removals; SUD in indigenous communities

Priority Strategies:

Food knowledge and security programs

- 1. Family Gardening: provide gardening classes with supplies needed to grow their garden
- 2. Shopping knowledge: provide shopping classes with handouts on what aisles to avoid & label reading
- 3. Cooking classes: provide nutritional information, how to cook on a budget
- 4. Bringing families and providers together around food access questions networking between social service and food access agencies

Transportation access

- 5. Connect with local resources and networks that already exist to help spread knowledge of resources local governments, TEDD, rural resources
- 6. Create a resource document that can be shared with all cities in both counties available at school functions, community cafes, locally departments, etc.

Indigenous Birth Justice

- 7. Doula trainings in Ferry and Stevens and for Indigenous community members
- 8. Align DCYF funding with existing IBJ Network work home visiting program for new Indigenous families
