II. Administrative Operations

3. Mission/Goals of Agency

The Washington State Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF) mission is to, "Protect children and strengthen families so they flourish".

The Washington State Department of Children, Youth, and Families vision is to see that "All Washington's children and youth grow up safe and healthy – thriving physically, emotionally, and educationally, nurtured by family and community".

The primary goals of the DCYF are to focus on the themes of child safety, child and family well-being, and permanency for the children, youth, and families we serve. A fourth goal focuses on the systemic factors that are necessary in a high performing organization to support excellent outcomes for children, youth, and families.

These goals are defined as:

- Child Safety: Children and youth will be safe from abuse and neglect.
- Child & Family Well-Being: Help families and communities improve the well-being of children and youth residing in their own homes and in out-of-home care.
- Permanency: Provide stable, nurturing, and permanent placements as quickly as possible for children and youth who are placed into out-of-home care.
- Supporting Client Outcomes (Organizational Well-Being): Continuously improve the organization's capacity to achieve excellent outcomes for children, youth, and families.

4. Description of Financial Operations Systems

The Agency Financial Reporting System (AFRS) is Washington State's central location for accounting information. This system is integrated with the Cost Allocation System (CAS). The CAS mirrors the Agency's federally approved written Public Assistance Cost Allocation Plan (PACAP) to allocate the AFRS financial transactions. The CAS uses real data, not estimates, to cost allocate expenditures as they occur.

The PACAP is submitted to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Division of Cost Allocation (DCA). Cost allocation methods include a random moment time sample (RMTS), provider time studies, case counts, penetration rates, full-time equivalents (FTEs), and funding mix ratios.

Criteria for estimating expenditures and allocating funds within the DCYF is based on historical expenditure patterns and determined programmatic needs. The DCYF sets program and budget priorities by reviewing the overall budget as passed by the Washington State Legislature. The DCYF publishes an annual notice on public websites making the SSBG Pre-Expenditure Intended Use State Plan available and open to public comment.

2. Describe the Characteristics of Individuals to be Served

The DCYF plans to serve individuals based on defined eligibility requirements necessary to receive services. Within this set of individuals, the following definitions apply:

Case Management, Foster Care, Protective Services, Transportation, and other services:

- Children, Youth, and Young Adults – any person from the age of 0 to 23.

Day Care:

- Children and Youth – Day Care is available for children twelve years of age and younger, as well as youth, 13-17 years of age, with a disability which makes them incapable of caring for their self due to physical, mental or emotional disabilities. Verification of disability must be conducted by a doctor, nurse, nurse practitioner, or master-level or above mental health, education, or Social Service professional, or under court supervision.

c. Description of Services The DCYF places waiting children and youth in homes with approved adoptive families and provides planning, preparation, and pre and post placement services to the adoptive child, youth, and family
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) The DCYF's Adoption program focuses exclusively on placing special needs children and youth in adoptive foster care homes. These children and youth may be difficult to place for adoption because of emotional and behavioral problems, developmental delays, or because they are part of a sibling group or are over the age of five
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area Adoption Services recruit and screen families interested in adopting children and youth who are in the care and custody of the department. Adoption services are available statewide.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF utilizes a wide variety of service providers via the use of a service referral. The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. The DCYF aligns expenditures with allowable categories in an effort to deliver needed services for children, youth, and families regardless the fund source. The DCYF does not have Subgrantees for this category.

2. Program Operations – Case Management Services

a. Service Category (use uniform definition) – Case Management Services

c. Description of Services Case management services include assessing the situation of the child, youth and family, planning for a permanent living situation for the child or youth, and maintaining contact with family members when the child or youth is placed out of their home of origin.
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) The DCYF provides case management services to children and youth who have experienced or are at risk of child abuse and neglect.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area Case management occurs through ongoing conversations with children, youth, families and caregivers. Case management services are provided statewide.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF utilizes a wide variety of service providers via the use of a service referral. The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. The DCYF aligns expenditures with allowable categories in an effort to deliver needed services for children, youth, and families regardless the fund source. The DCYF does not have Subgrantees for this category.

4. Program Operations – Counseling Services

a. Service Category (use uniform definition) – Counseling Services
b. SSBG Goal 2. Achieve or maintain self-sufficiency, including reduction or prevention of dependency. 3. c. Description of Services Counseling services are a collaborative effort between the provider and client. Counselors help clients identify goals and potential solutions to problems which cause emotional turmoil; seek to improve communication and coping skills; strengthen self-esteem; and promote behavior change and optimal mental health.
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) Counseling services are provided to families, children, and youth who have experienced or are at risk of child abuse and neglect.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area Counseling services are assessed and referred through the following DCYF program areas: Child Protective Services (CPS), Family Preservation Services (FPS), Child and Family Welfare Services (CFWS), Family Voluntary Services (FVS), Adoption and Adoption Support. Providers are available statewide and selected based on proximity to recipient.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF utilizes a wide variety of service providers via the use of a service referral. The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. The DCYF aligns expenditures with allowable categories in an effort to deliver needed services for children, youth, and families regardless the fund source. The DCYF does not have Subgrantees for this category.

c. Description of Services Child care services may be provided in a child's home or in a licensed/certified child care facility.
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) Services are typically for children ages 0 to 12 years of age; however, child care services may be provided beyond age 12 for a child or youth with special needs.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area The DCYF provides child care services to families who are involved with DCYF and the services are a part of the case plan for a child. Providers are available statewide and selected based on proximity to recipient.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF utilizes a wide variety of service providers via the use of a service referral. The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. The DCYF aligns expenditures with allowable categories in an effort to deliver needed services for children, youth, and families regardless the fund source. The DCYF does not have Subgrantees for this category.

11. Program Operations – Foster Care Services for Children

a. Service Category (use uniform definition) – Prevention and Intervention Services
b. SSBG Goal 2. Achieve or maintain self-sufficiency, including reduction or prevention of dependency. 3. Prevent or remedy neglect, abuse, or exploitation of children and adults unable to protect their own interests or preserve, rehabilitate, or reunite families. 5. c. Description of Services The DCYF provides services to support children and youth in foster care. This may include but is not limited to clothing, meals for children or youth, and special fees for activities outlined in the case plan. The DCYF Licensing Division (LD) and private agencies share responsibility for foster home recruitment and retention. Recruitment occurs primarily through contracts as described below, however the LD is responsible for the final approval of all foster care licenses. The DCYF promotes a long-term, grassroots community engagement effort for recruitment and ongoing support for foster parents.
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) Foster homes provide twenty-four-hour care for children and youth of all ages who need temporary or extended out-of-home placement due to child abuse, neglect, or family conflict.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area Foster care is provided by licensed foster parents or unlicensed relative caregivers and is viewed as a short-term solution to an emergent situation. The goal of foster care services is to return each child or youth home safely or to find another appropriate permanent home as quickly and safely as possible. Foster care services are also available with licensed foster parents through contracted community child placing agencies. Providers are available statewide and determined based upon proximity to the recipient.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF contracts with community agencies for Behavior Rehabilitation Services (BRS) for children and youth with serious emotional, behavioral, or medical difficulties who cannot be adequately served in family foster homes. BRS provides a high level of care and treatment for children and youth with the most severe and intensive needs. BRS is time limited with a focus on a return to a less restrictive environment. Services are offered in an array of settings including the child or youth's home, a treatment foster home, or a group residential setting.

d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) The DCYF provides health related services to children, youth, and caregivers to help attain and maintain physical or mental health.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area Health related and home health services are assessed and referred through the following DCYF program areas: Child Protective Services (CPS), Family Preservation Services (FPS), Child and Family Welfare Services (CFWS), Family Voluntary Services (FVS), Adoption and Adoption Support. Providers are available statewide and selected based on proximity to recipient.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF utilizes a wide variety of service providers via the use of a service referral. The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. The DCYF aligns expenditures with allowable categories in an effort to deliver needed services for children, youth, and families regardless the fund source. The DCYF does not have Subgrantees for this category.

c. Description of Services The DCYF home based services include home maintenance services and household management services as well as respite services covered in Category 11, Foster Care Services for Children.
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) The DCYF provides home based services to families who are seeking help to manage children or youth and to keep their families safely together in their home.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area Home based services are assessed and referred through the following DCYF program areas: Child Protective Services (CPS), Family Preservation Services (FPS), Child and Family Welfare Services (CFWS), Family Voluntary Services (FVS), Adoption and Adoption Support. Providers are available statewide and selected based on proximity to recipient.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF utilizes a wide variety of service providers via the use of a service referral. The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. The DCYF aligns expenditures with allowable categories in an effort to deliver needed services for children, youth, and families regardless the fund source. The DCYF does not have Subgrantees for this category.

16. Program Operations – Independent and Transitional Living Services

a. Service Category (use uniform definition) – Independent and Transitional Living Services
b. SSBG Goal 1. Achieve or maintain economic self-support to prevent, reduce, or eliminate dependency. 2. Achieve or maintain self-sufficiency, including reduction or prevention of dependency.
c. Description of Services Services may include; but are not limited to, life skills training, educational services, as well as housing and employment supports.
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) The DCYF provides independent and transitional living services to assist youth likely to age out of foster care and young adults making the transition from an institution to independent living.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area Independent and transitional living services are assessed and referred by the youth's assigned caseworker. Providers are available statewide and selected based on proximity to recipient and ability to meet identified needs.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF utilizes a wide variety of service providers via the use of a service referral. The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. The DCYF aligns expenditures with allowable categories in an effort to deliver needed services for children, youth, and families regardless the fund source. The DCYF does not have Subgrantees for this category.

17. Program Operations – Information and Referral

a. Service Category (use uniform definition) – Information and Referral
b. SSBG Goal 3. Prevent or remedy neglect, abuse, or exploitation of children and adults unable to protect their own interests or preserve, rehabilitate, or reunite families. 4. Prevent or reduce inappropriate institutional care by providing for community-based care, home-based care, or other forms of less intensive care.
c. Description of Services The DCYF information and referral services include referring parents to a wide array of community services to prevent potential child abuse and neglect from occurring.
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) The DCYF provides information and referral services to families who are seeking help to manage children or youth with the goal of keeping families safely together.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area A Service assessment and referral are completed by the assigned caseworker. Providers are available statewide and selected based on proximity to recipient and ability to meet identified needs.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF utilizes a wide variety of service providers via the use of a service referral. The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. The DCYF aligns expenditures with allowable categories in an effort to deliver needed services for children, youth, and families regardless the fund source. The DCYF does not have Subgrantees for this category.

a. Service Category (use uniform definition) – Legal Services
b. SSBG Goal 3. Prevent or remedy neglect, abuse, or exploitation of children and adults unable to protect their own interests or preserve, rehabilitate, or reunite families.
c. Description of Services The DCYF contracts to provide legal representation to children, youth, and families through all stages of foster care related legal proceedings. The DCYF may provide payment for administrative costs, services or activities related to preparing for and representation at hearings, provision of legal advice, and legal counseling.
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) Quality legal representation is provided by contracted agencies. Legal services are provided statewide.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area The DCYF social worker works to refer clients to legal services through a service referral as identified in the case plan. Services are available statewide based upon proximity of the recipient.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF utilizes a wide variety of service providers via the use of a service referral. The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. The DCYF aligns expenditures with allowable categories in an effort to deliver needed services for children, youth, and families regardless the fund source. The DCYF does not have Subgrantees for this category.

Description of Services Family Preservation Services (FPS) interventions focus on resolving the immediate crisis and strengthening a family's relationships through a variety of community resources. FPS are available to families within 48 hours of referral and are offered for a maximum of six months by a contracted service provider. As child maltreatment is closely associated with domestic violence, DCYF provides routine screening for domestic violence at intake and during investigation, and as part of service planning and case review. This includes conducting a specialized assessment of the safety threat which domestic violence poses to a child or youth.
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) The DCYF's Family Preservation Services (FPS) are available to families whose children or youth face substantial likelihood of being placed outside of the home or to assist with safely reunifying a child or youth with their family from out-of-home care.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area Service assessment and referral are completed by the assigned caseworker. Providers are available statewide and selected based on proximity to recipient and ability to meet identified needs.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF utilizes a wide variety of service providers via the use of a service referral. The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. The DCYF aligns expenditures with allowable categories in an effort to deliver needed services for children, youth, and families regardless the fund source. Description of Services Intake, screening, and investigative services are handled through an assessment by staff which help to identify necessary responses to children, youth, and families in crisis. Referrals to CPS help provide timely and appropriate levels of response with the priority being the safety and protection of children and youth.
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) Intake, screening, and investigative services are handled through an assessment by staff which help to identify necessary responses to children, youth, and families in crisis. Referrals to CPS help provide timely and appropriate levels of response with the priority being the safety and protection of children and youth.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area Child Protective Services are available statewide and based on the proximity of the recipient.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.

The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. c. Description of Services Crisis Residential Centers (CRC) provide temporary shelter twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week. Placement is limited to a maximum of five days. The services CRCs' provide are focused on assessing the youth's needs and safely reunifying the family.
d. Description of Recipients (eligibility considerations) The DCYF contracts with CRCs' to provide temporary shelter for youth ages 12 through 17 who run away from home, are in severe conflict with their parent(s), or are foster youth in need of a crisis placement.
e. Method of Delivery and Geographic Area Residential Treatment Services are available statewide and, when possible, based on the proximity of the recipient.
f. Partnering State Agency The DCYF does not allocate SSBG funds to partnering State Agencies.
g. Subgrantee / Service Providers The DCYF utilizes a wide variety of service providers via the use of a service referral. The service referral identifies the provider name, type of service, and frequency of the service. The DCYF aligns expenditures with allowable categories in an effort to deliver needed services for children, youth, and families regardless the fund source. The DCYF does not have Subgrantees for this category.

Certification Regarding Drug-Free Workplace

The Department of Children, Youth, and Families (DCYF), State of Washington, certifies that it has developed policies and procedures in association with employee organizations and the Washington State Employee Advisory Service to provide a drug-free workplace. The process has resulted in:

5. Notifying the agency in writing within ten days after receiving notice under Subparagraph 4.b. above from an employee, or otherwise receiving actual notice of such conviction. Employers of convicted employees must provide notice, including position title, to every grant officer on whose grant activity the convicted employee was working, unless the federal agency has designated a central point for the receipt of such notices. Notice shall include the identification number(s) of each affected grant;
6. Taking one of the following actions, within 30 days of receiving notice under Subparagraph 4.b. above, with respect to any employee who is so convicted:
 - a. Taking appropriate personnel action against such an employee, up to and including termination consistent with the requirements of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, as amended; or
 - b. Requiring such employee to participate satisfactorily in a drug abuse assistance or rehabilitation program approved for such purposes by a federal, state, or local health, law enforcement, or other appropriate agency.
7. Making a good faith effort to continue to maintain a drug-free workplace through implementation of Paragraphs 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6 above.




