This memo replaces the Change to the 5150. Licensing Investigations memo dated June 5, 2024.

**Purpose:**

The purpose of this policy memo is to provide guidance on the new licensing complaint investigation requirements for licensed kinship caregivers when allegations do not involve alleged child abuse or neglect. Non-CPS Licensing Investigations will now be discontinued on licensed kinship caregiver homes.

**Policy**

1. LD Safety and Monitoring (SAM) and Child Protective Services (CPS) investigators must use the same investigation standards for licensed kinship caregivers, as used for unlicensed kinship caregivers.
2. LD SAM workers **and Regional Licensors** must:
  - a. Not investigate non-Child Protective Services (CPS) licensing complaints on licensed kinship caregiver homes.
  - b. Complete all provider actions for non-CPS complaint intakes as “Screen Out” and assess for needed supports.
3. LD CPS investigators must continue to investigate intakes received on a kinship caregiver home that involve alleged child abuse or neglect.
