


Fair Start for Kids Act, Section 305

What	For Whom
establish a dual language designation and provide subsidy rate enhancements or site-specific grants	licensed or certified child care providers who are accepting state subsidy ECEAP or early ECEAP contractors

Legislative Requirements

- 1. use of rate enhancements or site-specific grants to include:
 - increased wages for individual staff who provide bilingual instruction,
 - professional development training,
 - purchase of dual language culturally appropriate curricula and accompanying training programs,
 - instructional materials, or
 - other related expenses.
- 2. consult with a culturally and linguistically diverse stakeholder advisory group to develop criteria for the dual language designation



TRIBAL LANGUAGE AND CULTURE GUIDELINES


Standard	Practices	
Tribal Elders and family members are welcome to participate in the program.	a) There are opportunities for families to learn the language.b) Elders are invited to visit classrooms several times a year.c) Family members are invited to share their culture.	
Tribal cultural activities are available as part of the program.	a) Tribal groups represented in the program are the primary sources for programming.b) Cultural activities such as dance, seasonal harvesting, foods, music, art, storytelling, and traditional teachings are shared in the classroom.	
3. Tribal designees lead lessons for children and staff.	a) Tribal designee leads lessons for children.b) Other teachers incorporate words/language into their teaching.c) Language classes are available for staff.	

Coaches shared that this is happening:

- Tribal Language & Culture Guidelines
 - Tribal language is being used orally and written
 - Cultural practices like drumming, singing, chanting
 - Teachers integrate ways of being in lessons


Roundtable listening session

What we heard:

- Language revitalization awards vs. dual language awards
 - Separate awards & provide more for Tribes as there are higher needs
- Awards should be per classroom
- Tribal programs must be prioritized

What we did:

- Language revitalization will receive \$4,100
 - Dual language will receive \$2,700
- Awards are per classroom, up to 10 classrooms per facility
- Tribal programs are top priority



Priority 3: 1+ factor










Funding Award Prioritization

- > Tribal Language
- Extreme child care access deserts (by zip code)
- Marginalized low-income (by zip code)
 - High child maltreatment
 - High childhood poverty
 - Rural counties
- Communities of Color (by zip code)
 - Over 50% children of color under age 15
