AUDIT FINDINGS

Narrative:

Juvenile Rehabilitation (JR), hereinafter referred to as the Agency, requested a PREA Audit for the Ridgeview Community Facility (Facility) in the summer of 2016. The pre-audit work for each this facility began on October 3, 2016 and the onsite portion of the audit was conducted between December 8, 2016 and December 10, 2016.

In completing the PREA audit for Facility, this auditor reviewed the Facility's Pre-Audit Questionnaire, submitted using the online PREA Audit system, all related attachments, and utilized a Pre-Audit conference call with the Facility Director who was also the Facility's PREA Compliance Manager. During the onsite portion of the audit this Auditor interviewed the Director, who was also the Facility's PREA Compliance Manager, Human Resources staff assigned to the Facility, a volunteer, the staff who perform screening for risk of victimization and abusiveness, the designated staff member charged with monitoring retaliation, and intake staff. In addition, this auditor interviewed 11 randomly selected security staff and all 12 residents at the facility at the time of the audit. Aside from the interviews, this Auditor reviewed 21 employee files [selected using random sampling], reviewed sexual abuse investigation files, reviewed five volunteer and contractor files, reviewed 20 resident files, and read all the related PREA policies and procedures. Further, this Auditor used the Facility tour and interviews to determine if Facility's procedures were being implemented as written. In all, this Auditor spent a total of 48 hours, or six days, conducting and finalizing the Facility's audit.

AUDIT FINDINGS

Facility Characteristics:

The auditor's description of the audited facility should include details about the type of the facility, demographics and size of the inmate or resident population, numbers and type of staff positions, configuration and layout of the facility, numbers of housing units, description of housing units including any special housing units, a description of programs and services, including food service and recreation.

The Ridgeview Community Facility (Ridgeview) is a single building property with one "out" building. The single out building is a storage shed located beside the main facility. The main building is a single-story structure with 8 double occupancy rooms. The main floor is divided into two housing units that correspond to the two residential hallways. Of the 8 rooms, 3 are located in a "small hallway" and the remaining 5 bedrooms are located in a separate "long" hallway.

Ridgeview has a designed capacity of 16. The facility is designed to house residents aged 14 to 20. The facility's security level is rated as a "minimum" and the resident custody levels range is considered "minimum" per interviews with JR staff. Ridgeview is not considered a "secure" facility as residents are expected, and required, to leave the facility and take part in community activities (e.g., school, work, volunteer, etc.). As of October 2016, the facility was authorized to employ up to 21 staff members. All staff are considered 'security' staff for the purpose of the staff-to-resident ratio as defined by PREA. The facility has multiple security cameras located in and around the facility but none of the cameras are located in the resident's bedroom or shower/toileting areas. Educational services are provided at an onsite classroom. After classes, the residents are encouraged to find employment within the community. . Due to this, the facility is not considered a "secure" facility per PREA requirements.

Medical care is provided off-site at local area medical clinics and hospitals. Mental health services are provided by off-site counselors and therapists.

AUDIT FINDINGS

At the conclusion of this audit process, it was found that the Facility was making great strides at implementing and improving its policies and procedures related to PREA compliance. There are 43 PREA Standards that specifically apply to the Facility. Of these 43 PREA Standards, the following determinations were made: The Facility exceeded requirements on three standard (115.331, 115.333, and 115.365); was determined to not meet requirements on two standards (115.317 and 115.341); was determined that five standards were not applicable and/or were Agency specific standards (115.312, 115.387, 115.388, 115.389, and 115.403); and it was determined the Facility meet requirements on the remaining 33 standards.

To address the issues related to the PREA Standards that "Did Not Meet" requirements the Facility, in collaboration with this Auditor, developed a Corrective Action Plan [CAP]. The Facility entered into a CAP period on January 9, 2017 and the CAP period will end on or before July 8, 2017. As part of the CAP, the Facility is tasked with ensuring that all staff, contractors, and new hires have a criminal history background check that includes a check against a national crime records database; and staff who conduct risk screening utilize the information in the Medical Data Sheet-Long Form (or other process to identify any gender nonconforming appearance or manner or identification as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex, and whether the resident may therefore be vulnerable to sexual abuse) to reduce the risk of sexual abuse by or upon a resident.

The facility formally exited the corrective action plan period on July 6, 2017 after completing the following tasks: (1) Ensuring that all staff, contractors, and new hires have a criminal history background check that includes a check against a national crime records database; and (2) Training staff who conduct risk screening to utilize the information in the Medical Data Sheet-Long Form (or other process to identify any gender nonconforming appearance or manner or identification as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, or intersex, and whether the resident may therefore be vulnerable to sexual abuse) to reduce the risk of sexual abuse by or upon a residents. Thus, the facility is determined to meet all applicable PREA standards.

	<p>Auditor Discussion</p> <p>A review of the relevant policies and procedures, the Pre-Audit Questionnaire, as well as interviews with the Agency Head, PREA Coordinator (called the PREA Administrator), the Facility Superintendent, who is also the Facility’s PREA Compliance Manager, confirmed that the agency has a written policy mandating zero tolerance toward all forms of sexual abuse and sexual harassment, that the agency has a written policy that outlines the agency’s approach to preventing, detecting, and responding to such conduct, that the agency does employ or designate an upper-level, agency-wide PREA coordinator (called the PREA Administrator) who does have sufficient time and authority to develop, implement, and oversee agency efforts to comply with the PREA standards in all of its facilities, and that the facility has designated a PREA compliance manager who reports that they have sufficient time and authority to coordinate the facility’s efforts to comply with the PREA standards. Thus, it was determined that the facility meets this standard.</p>

	Interviews with the Agency Head, PREA Coordinator (called PREA Administrator), and the Facility Director supported the agency's contention that the agency does not contract for the confinement of its residents with private agencies or other entities, including other government agencies. Thus, this standard is considered to be "not applicable."

	A review of the facility's staffing plan and interviews with the PREA Administrator, the Facility Superintendent, who is also the Facility's PREA Compliance Manager, noted that a staffing plan has been created; that deviations from the staffing plan are documented, when necessary; that the staffing plan is reviewed annually. As this facility is considered not to be a "secure" facility as defined by PREA, unannounced rounds are not required. Thus, it was determined that the facility meets this standard.

	<p>A review of relevant policies and procedures, as well as, interviews with the Facility Superintendent, who is also the Facility's PREA Compliance Manager, 11 randomly selected security staff, and interviews with all 12 residents at the facility at the time of the PREA audit, supported the facility's contention that facility staff do not conduct cross-gender strip searches or cross-gender visual body cavity searches (meaning a search of the anal or genital opening) except in exigent circumstances or when performed by medical practitioners; facility staff do not conduct cross-gender pat-down searches except in exigent circumstances; that facility staff document all cross-gender strip searches and cross-gender visual body cavity searches and that staff document all cross-gender pat-down searches of female residents; that the facility does implement policies and procedures that enable residents to shower, perform bodily functions, and change clothing without nonmedical staff of the opposite gender viewing their breasts, buttocks, or genitalia, except in exigent circumstances or when such viewing is incidental to routine cell checks. Further, it was determined that the facility's policies and procedures does require staff of the opposite gender to announce their presence when entering an resident housing unit and that the facility does not search or physically examine a transgender or intersex resident for the sole purpose of determining the resident's genital status. It was also determined that if the resident's genital status is unknown, it may be determined during conversations with the resident, by reviewing medical records, or, if necessary, by learning that information as part of a broader medical examination conducted in private by a medical practitioner. However, four (4) of the 11 interviews of security staff (36.4%) could not recall being provided training on how to conduct cross-gender pat-down searches, and searches of transgender and intersex residents, in a professional and respectful manner and in the least intrusive manner possible, consistent with security needs. Thus, the facility is determined to not meet this standard.</p> <p>To address this finding the following Corrective Action Plan is presented: (1) Train staff, especially any staff who have not completed Community Safety Training, on how to conduct cross-gender pat-down searches, and searches of transgender and intersex residents, in a professional and respectful manner and in the least intrusive manner possible, consistent with security needs; and (2) Submit evidence to this auditor that staff attended and understood this training.</p> <p>FINAL DETERMINATION: On January 4, 2017, this Auditor received confirmation that all staff completed a training on how to conduct cross-gender pat-down searches, and searches of transgender and intersex residents, in a professional and respectful manner and in the least intrusive manner possible, consistent with security needs. Thus, the facility is now considered to meet this standard.</p>

	<p>A review of relevant policies and procedures, as well as, interviews with the staff responsible for intake, the staff responsible for PREA Education, the facility's PREA Compliance Manager, and interviews with all 12 residents at the facility at the time of the PREA audit, supported the facility's contention that facility staff take appropriate steps to ensure that residents with disabilities have an equal opportunity to participate in or benefit from all aspects of the agency's efforts to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment; that the facility staff take reasonable steps to ensure meaningful access to all aspects of the agency's efforts to prevent, detect, and respond to sexual abuse and sexual harassment to residents who are limited English proficient, including steps to provide interpreters who can interpret effectively, accurately and impartially, both receptively and expressively, using any necessary specialized vocabulary; and the facility does not rely on resident interpreters, resident readers, or other types of resident assistants except in limited circumstances where an extended delay in obtaining an effective interpreter could compromise the resident's safety, the performance of first-response duties under §115.64, or the investigation of the resident's allegations. Thus, the facility is determined to meet this standard.</p>

	<p data-bbox="252 170 896 203">Auditor Overall Determination: Meets Standard</p> <p data-bbox="252 248 523 282">Auditor Discussion</p> <p data-bbox="252 327 1484 1644">A review of relevant policies and procedures, a review of 10 randomly selected staff files, as well as, interviews with Human Resource Staff supported the agency's contention that the agency does not hire or promote anyone who may have contact with residents and does not enlist the services of any contractor who may have contact with residents, who has engaged in sexual misconduct [e.g., (1) Has engaged in sexual abuse in a prison, jail, lockup, community confinement facility, juvenile facility, or other institution (as defined in 42 U.S.C. 1997); (2) Has been convicted of engaging or attempting to engage in sexual activity in the community facilitated by force, overt or implied threats of force, or coercion, or if the victim did not consent or was unable to consent or refuse; or (3) Has been civilly or administratively adjudicated to have engaged in the activity described in paragraph (a)(2) of this section]; that staff consider any incidents of sexual harassment in determining whether to hire or promote anyone, or to enlist the services of any contractor, who may have contact with residents; that Human Resource staff, before hiring new employees who may have contact with residents, conduct the required background checks [e.g., (1) Perform a criminal background records check; and (2) Consistent with Federal, State, and local law, make its best efforts to contact all prior institutional employers for information on substantiated allegations of sexual abuse or any resignation during a pending investigation of an allegation of sexual abuse]; that Human Resource staff also perform a criminal background records check before enlisting the services of any contractor who may have contact with residents; that Human Resource staff either conduct criminal background records checks at least every five years of current employees and contractors who may have contact with residents or have in place a system for otherwise capturing such information for current employees; that Human Resource Staff ask all applicants and employees who may have contact with residents directly about previous sexual misconduct, described above, in written applications or interviews for hiring or promotions and in any interviews or written self-evaluations conducted as part of reviews of current employees. Agency policy and procedure also imposes upon employees a continuing affirmative duty to disclose any such misconduct and these same policies and procedures note that material omissions regarding such misconduct, or the provision of materially false information, is grounds for termination. However, there was no evidence that the agency's background check included a review of national crime databases (e.g., Federal Bureau of Investigations, etc.), thus it was determined that the facility did not meet this standard.</p> <p data-bbox="252 1697 1452 1944">Based on this finding, the following Corrective Action Plan was implemented: (1) Ensure that all criminal background checks related to PREA include a check against national crime databases (e.g., Federal Bureau of Investigations, etc.): (2) Submit evidence to this auditor that criminal record checks include a check against at least one national database; and (3) Submit evidence to this Auditor of a criminal background check that was run against the national database.</p> <p data-bbox="252 1998 1465 2074">The facility completed all corrective action plan items related to this standard on July 6, 2017. Thus, the facility is determined to meet standard.</p>

115.318	Upgrades to facilities and technologies

	<p>Interviews with the Facility Superintendent, who is also the Facility’s PREA Compliance Manager, and observations during the facility tour confirmed that the facility has not designed or acquired any new facility and is not currently planning any substantial expansion or modification of existing facilities. However, the facility did install an expanded electronic surveillance system, specifically, 10 new cameras in areas that were identified as blind spots. It was determined that when installing or updating a video monitoring system, electronic surveillance system, or other monitoring technology, the agency did consider how such technology may enhance the agency’s ability to protect residents from sexual abuse. Thus, the facility is determined to meet this standard.</p>

115.321	Evidence protocol and forensic medical examinations

	<p>Reviews of applicable policies and procedures and reviews of completed investigations, interviews with the Facility Superintendent, who is also the Facility’s PREA Compliance Manager, and with local area hospital staff, as well as, interviews with agency/facility investigators, supported the contention that the facility does not conduct sexual abuse investigations. Those investigations are all referred out to Child Protective Services and/or local law enforcement. Documentation was provided that Child Protective Services and local law enforcement were asked to follow a uniform evidence protocol that maximizes the potential for obtaining usable physical evidence for administrative proceedings and criminal prosecutions and that the protocol be developmentally appropriate for youth and, as appropriate, shall be adapted from or otherwise based on the most recent edition of the U.S. Department of Justice’s Office on Violence Against Women publication, “A National Protocol for Sexual Assault Medical Forensic Examinations, Adults and/or Adolescents,” or similarly comprehensive and authoritative protocols developed after 2011. Interviews with staff supported the agency’s contention that all residents who experience sexual abuse will be provided access to forensic medical examinations whether on-site or at an outside facility, without financial cost, where evidentiarily or medically appropriate. Such examinations will be performed by Sexual Assault Forensic Examiners (SAFEs) or Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (SANEs) where possible. In the event that a SAFEs or SANEs cannot be made available, the examination would be performed by other qualified medical practitioners. The facility has documented its efforts to provide SAFEs or SANEs and this was verified via a phone call with the local area hospital identified in the facility’s Coordinated Response Plan. The facility does attempt to make available to the victim a victim advocate from a rape crisis center. If a rape crisis center is not available to provide victim advocate services, the agency will make available, to provide these services, a qualified staff member from a community-based organization or a qualified agency staff member. The facility has documented efforts to secure services from rape crisis centers. Further, as requested by the victim, the victim advocate, qualified agency staff member, or qualified community-based organization staff member shall accompany and support the victim through the forensic medical examination process and investigatory interviews and shall provide emotional support, crisis intervention, information, and referrals. Thus, the facility is determined to meet this standard.</p>

	<p>A review of policies and procedures and via interviews with the Facility Superintendent, who is also the facility's PREA Compliance Manager, the facility's investigator supported the facility's contention that an administrative or criminal investigation is completed for all allegations of sexual abuse and sexual harassment and that the facility does have in place a policy to ensure that allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment are referred for investigation to an agency with the legal authority to conduct criminal investigations (e.g., Child Protective Services and/or local law enforcement), unless the allegation does not involve potentially criminal behavior. It should be noted that this Auditor could not examine a completed sexual abuse or sexual harassment investigation as the facility had no allegations of sexual abuse or sexual harassment during the time period under review for this PREA Audit. The agency does publish such policy on its website (at https://www.dshs.wa.gov/ra/juvenile-rehabilitation/prison-rape-elimination-act-compliance on December 3, 2016) and as a separate entity is responsible for conducting criminal investigations, the publication does describe the responsibilities of both the agency and the investigating entity. Thus, the facility is determined to meet this standard.</p>

	<p>In a review of 10 randomly selected staff files, interviews with the facility’s PREA Compliance Manager, and interviews with 11 randomly selected security staff determined that the agency does train all employees who may have contact with residents on 11 required topics related to this PREA standard and that such training is tailored to the unique needs and attributes of residents of juvenile facilities and to the gender of the residents at the employee’s facility. Further, it was determined that employees do receive additional training if the employee is reassigned from a facility that houses only male residents to a facility that houses only female residents, or vice versa. A review of the 10 randomly selected staff files confirmed that all current employees have received the required PREA education training within the past year and that refresher training and refresher information is also provided to employees every other year. The facility’s PREA Compliance Manager documents, through employee signature or electronic verification, that employees understand the training they have received. Further, the agency requires that all new hires completed a PREA training prior to their first contact with any resident and then these same staff are required to complete an online training class specific to the PREA standards. This online class includes an exam at the end that each employee must pass. Further, the agency provides instructor led classes for each new hire related to PREA. Thus, it was determined that the agency and facility exceed this standard.</p>

115.332	Volunteer and contractor training

	<p>In a review of six randomly selected volunteer files and five randomly selected contractor files and via interviews with the facility's PREA Compliance Manager and interviews with volunteers and contractors it was determined that the agency does ensure that all volunteers and contractors who have contact with residents have been trained on their responsibilities under the agency's sexual abuse and sexual harassment prevention, detection, and response policies and procedures and that the level and type of training provided to volunteers and contractors is based on the services they provide and level of contact they have with residents. Interviews with volunteers and contractors confirmed that all volunteers and contractors who have contact with residents have been notified of the agency's zero-tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment and are informed how to report such incidents. Further, a review of the volunteer and contractors training files confirmed that the facility staff maintain documentation confirming that volunteers and contractors understood the training they have received. Further, the agency requires that all volunteers and contractors complete PREA training prior to their first contact with any resident. Thus, it was determined that the agency and facility meet this standard.</p>

115.333	Resident education
	Auditor Overall Determination: Exceeds Standard
	Auditor Discussion
	<p>This auditor reviewed policies and procedures, reviewed 18 client records, interviews with all 12 residents at the facility at the time of the PREA audit, and interviewed the facility's PREA Compliance Manager and staff responsible for ensuring that residents receive their PREA Information and PREA Education to help determine a compliance level for this standard. Based on this work, it was determined that during the intake process, residents do receive information explaining, in an age appropriate fashion, the agency's zero tolerance policy regarding sexual abuse and sexual harassment and how to report incidents or suspicions of sexual abuse or sexual harassment. It was also found that 100.0% of all resident records reviewed, that residents were provided with PREA Education within the required 10 days of intake. When PREA Education is provided it is comprehensive and age-appropriate and it does cover residents' rights to be free from sexual abuse and sexual harassment and to be free from retaliation for reporting such incidents, and regarding agency policies and procedures for responding to such incidents. This education is in formats accessible to all residents, including those who are limited English proficient, deaf, visually impaired, or otherwise disabled, as well as to residents who have limited reading skills and the facility does maintain documentation of resident participation in these education sessions. It was also determined that the facility does ensure that key information is continuously and readily available or visible to residents through posters, resident handbooks, or other written formats. Based on the fact that residents are provided with individualized PREA Information and PREA Education, and that this instruction is tailored to the unique needs of each resident, via individualized conversations, it was determined that the facility exceeds this standard.</p>

	<p>This auditor reviewed related policies and procedures, reviewed one (1) investigative staff training file, and interviewed the facility investigator. Transgender or intersex resident’s own views with respect to his or her own safety is given serious consideration and all residents are given the opportunity to shower separately from other residents, via private showers.
